During classroom guidance lessons, students at all levels will be learning how one kind act can lead to more - it makes others feel good, and in turn we feel goodwhen we spread kindness around our school, in our homes and throughout the community.

Kinder and 1st grade students will see how even a small act of kindness can make a huge difference for another person and may influence their future actions. They will listen to the story **Ordinary Mary's Extraordinary**Deed and generate ways to show kindness throughout the school.

1st graders will hear the story about **The Invisible Boy.** It is a story of how a simple act of

K-4th grade: They have been challenged to complete 100 kind acts. Each kind act should be written down and returned to Mrs. Romo so they

Middle School students will discuss the meaning of "paying it forward," continue to discuss career clusters, and start to develop college readiness skills such as writing a resume.
